Important to note eligibility criteria for programs. For example, a household experiencing chronic homelessness may access a shelter for homeless families, as there is no eligibility requirement or exclusion for chronic homelessness.

Mainstream Benefits

- **Social Services Agency (SSA)** – application and eligibility process for CalFresh, CalWorks, General Relief and TANF. SSA utilizes a Mobile Resource Vehicle to regional emergency shelters and other homeless service agencies to conduct eligibility screenings and applications for homeless individuals and families thus greatly reducing barriers to access and expediting the process to receive benefits.
- **Housing and Disability Advocacy Program (HDAP)** to assist homeless, disabled individuals in applying for disability benefits while receiving housing support.
- **SSI/SSDI Outreach, Access and recovery (SOAR)** to help homeless individuals and families complete SSI/SSDI applications.

Health Services

- **CalOptima** – County organized healthcare system has established a hotline specific for the homeless population to provide field-based support and case management to connect to primary care and specialized care
- **Community Health Centers**, including Federally Qualified Health Centers

- **Whole Person Care** – Targets homeless individuals who are high utilizers of the emergency medical system and connects them to recuperative care and housing resources. Includes coordination with Anaheim Global, Anaheim Regional Medical Center, Chapman Global, Kaiser in Anaheim and Irvine, Orange Coast Memorial, Orange County Global, Saddleback Memorial, South Coast Global, St. Joseph's Hospital and UCI Medical Center.
- Health services being co-located at emergency shelter locations and homeless service sites
- Recuperative Care – Hurtt Family Medical, Illumination Foundation, Mom's Retreat

Mental Health Services

- **OC Links** - information and Referral Line provides telephone and online support for anyone seeking information or linkage to any of the Health Care Agency's Behavioral Health Services. These services include children and adult mental health, alcohol and drug inpatient and outpatient, crisis programs, and prevention and early intervention services. Callers can be potential participants, family members, friends or anyone seeking out resources, or providers seeking information about Behavioral Health programs and services. Trained Navigators provide information, referral, and linkage directly to programs that meet the needs of callers.
- **Behavioral Health Outreach and Engagement**
- **Psychiatric Emergency Response Team (PERT)** pairs behavioral health clinicians with law enforcement to response to mental health related calls

Additionally, Chrysalis operates a social enterprise model in which they are able to hire homeless people into temporary jobs eliminating barriers to employment and ensuring homeless people to gain real-world skills and develop the experience needed to find and retain-long term employment. Chrysalis staff regularly provide presentations and trainings at emergency shelters to engage the homeless individuals and families and thus reducing barriers to accessing the program.

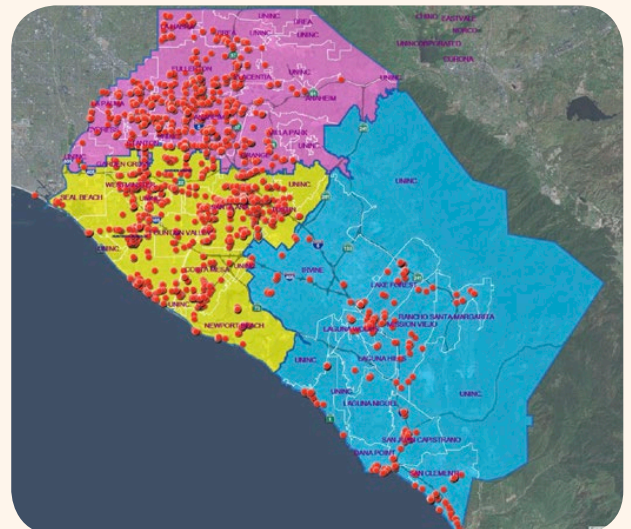

METHODOLOGY

The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) requires that all Continuum of Care jurisdictions across the nation complete a biennial unsheltered count and an annual sheltered count of all individuals experiencing homelessness in the community on a single point in time during the last ten days of January.

Orange County's 2019 Sheltered Point In Time Count took place the night of Tuesday, January 22, 2019. Emergency Shelters and Transitional Housing Programs collected client-level demographic information from individuals and families staying the night in each program. The 2019 Unsheltered Count process took place over two days, Wednesday, January 23 and Thursday, January 24, to ensure the 800 square mile County jurisdiction was canvassed effectively. The change in methodology allowed the count teams to collect unique ID data points that were used to deduplicate records for the two day street count process. The survey data was collected with ArcGIS Survey 123, a phone application that captures GIS locations and provides vital information that guides the way the County responds to homelessness in Orange County. The results for the 2019 Everyone Counts process provide the most accurate data on the scope of homelessness in the County. Because of this improved process, methodology and data quality from the use of GIS technology, Orange County's 2019 Point In Time Count results ensure that Everyone Counts.

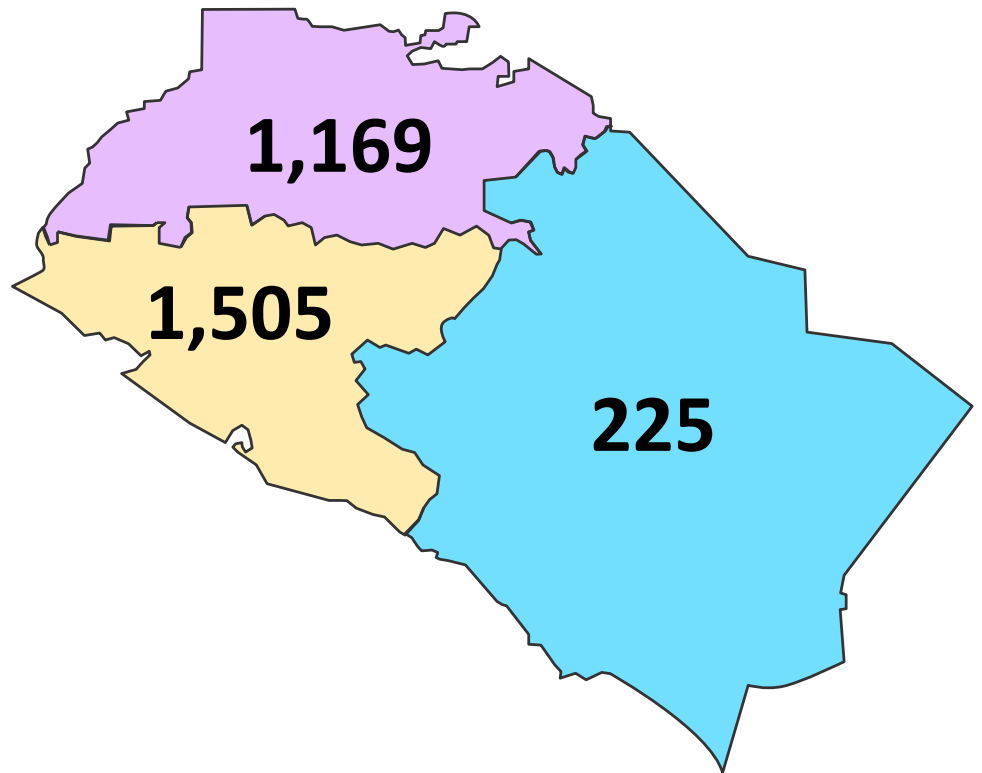

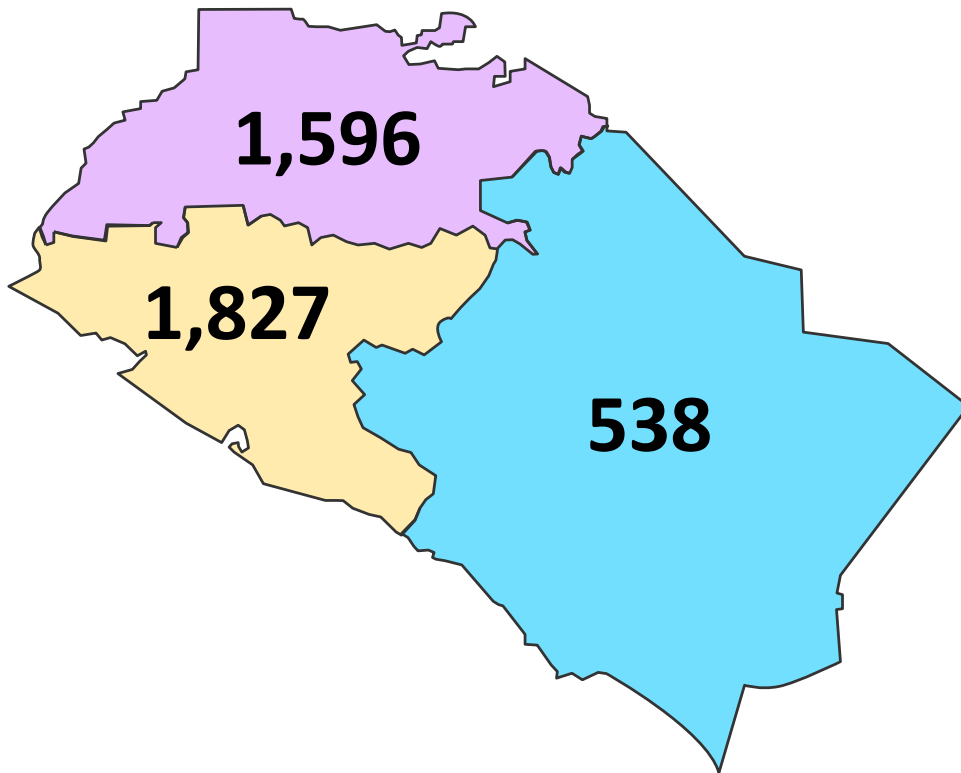

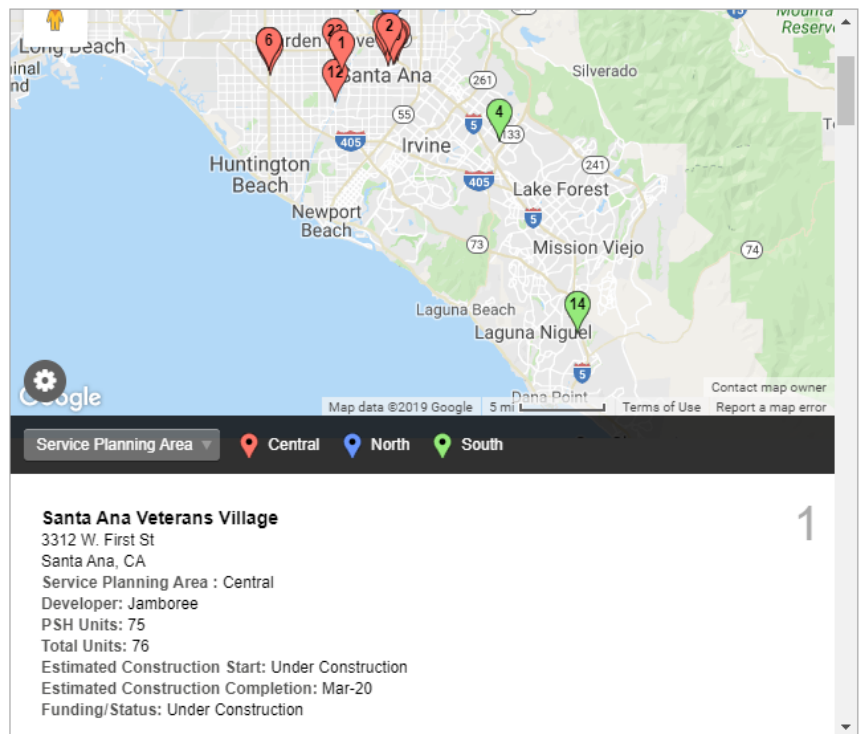

Program Overview

Launched in 1994, Families and Communities Together (FaCT) is a network of 15 Family Resource Centers (FRCs) located throughout Orange County's highest-risk communities providing essential family support services, education, and resources. FaCT is administered by the County of Orange Social Services Agency, in partnership with the FaCT Coalition of Charitable Ventures of Orange County, The Olin Group, and the Orange County Alliance for Children and Families. The FaCT Coalition facilitates the planning, implementation, evaluation, and support of services and activities that maximize the benefits offered by the FRCs. Programs and services receive funding from federal, state, and county agencies including U.S. Department of Health and Human Services-Promoting Safe and Stable Families, Office of Child Abuse Prevention, California Emergency Management Agency, the County of Orange, as well as volunteer, in-kind support, and private donations.

What is a FaCT Family Resource Center?



Each FRC is a family-friendly, community-based site that provides access to comprehensive prevention and treatment-oriented social, educational, and health services for all families, including birth, blended, kinship, adoptive, and foster families. FRCs serve as vehicles for engaging local residents and community organizations in the identification

and resolution of community concerns related to raising healthy children. Every FRC is unique to its community; services are offered by multicultural and multilingual staff that reflect the surrounding neighborhoods and the families they serve.

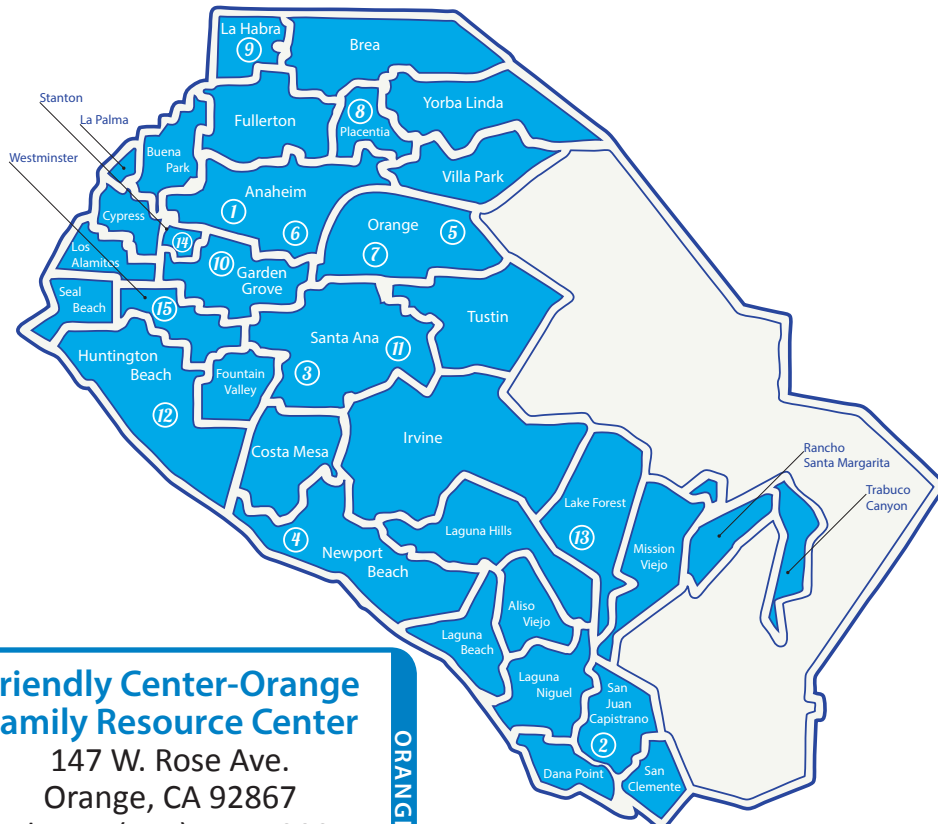
