I have reviewed the Agenda Staff Report on the Orange County Commission to End Homelessness Bylaw Revisions that is scheduled to be approved at the Board of Supervisors meeting on October 8, 2019. The District Attorney's Office shares your commitment to ending homelessness and respectfully requests that the voting membership of this Commission be expanded to include one Deputy District Attorney.

The Orange County District Attorney's Office takes a proactive approach to developing partnerships with public and private agencies designed to improve public safety and enhance the quality of life for the residents of our community. Throughout my career, I have been committed to addressing the issue of homelessness. As District Attorney, I have created the Recidivism Reduction Unit to focus on reducing crime by targeting the underlying issues including homelessness and mental illness. The six Deputy District Attorneys in this unit are experts in their field, have extensive experience working with the collaborative courts and demonstrate leadership and a commitment to address homelessness within Orange County.

While rehabilitation and housing for the homeless is supported by my office, there is also a serious need for discussion on enforcement and prosecution as is relates to addressing all of the issues related to homelessness. The District Attorney must be part of the solution to ending homelessness in Orange County.

Homeless Education – McKinney Vento Act **

- Primary federal legislative response to homelessness
- Subtitle VII-B focuses on the education of children and youth experiencing homelessness
- Establishes definition of <u>homeless</u> used by <u>schools</u> and the rights given to eligible students
- Ensures equal and immediate access to public education
- All schools required to: remove enrollment barriers, assist with attendance, and support academic success
- All school districts are required to have a homeless liaison





McKinney Vento Reauthorization

"After more than 10 years, members of Congress from both parties have come together to revise our national education law."

 The Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) was signed into law on Dec 10, 2015



 ESSA reauthorized the Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA) and the education subtitle of the McKinney-Vento Act



Homeless Education Definition

The term homeless children and youth means individuals who lack a fixed, regular, and adequate nighttime residence;

and includes...
children and youth who are
sharing the housing of other persons due to loss
of housing, economic hardship, or a similar reason





Homeless Education Definition

Fixed, regular, and adequate are defined as:

- A fixed residence is one that is stationary, permanent, and not subject to change
- A regular residence is one that is used on a normal, standard, and consistent basis
- An adequate residence is one that is sufficient for meeting both the physical and psychological needs typically met in home environments





Homeless Education Definition

Doubled/Tripled Up

 Sharing the housing of other persons due to loss of housing, economic hardship, natural disasters or a similar reason

Motels or Hotels

Shelters

Emergency or transitional

Unsheltered

- Public or private places not designed for sleeping, abandoned buildings
- Cars, trailer parks, parks or campgrounds

Unaccompanied Minor

Not in physical custody of parent or guardian

Student Rights: Immediate Enrollment

- McKinney Vento students entitled to immediate
 enrollment in any public school that students living in,
 even if students do not have required documents:
- Proof of residency
- School records
- Records of immunization
- Health records
- Guardianship
- Or other documents





Student Rights: School of Origin

Homeless students have the right to attend

School of Origin

The school that a child or youth attended when permanently housed, or

School in which the child or youth was last enrolled

Includes public preschools

Includes receiving schools (elementary-middle-high school pattern)

Or

School of Residence (local attendance area)

Any public school that non-homeless students who live in the attendance area in which the child or youth is actually living are eligible to attend







Student Rights: Transportation

 Transportation must be provided to and from the school of origin at the request of the parent or guardian, or, in the case of an unaccompanied minor

 Based on the amended definition of school of origin under ESSA, school of origin transportation rights extend to public preschools and receiving schools





Students Rights: Access to Services

- Homeless students equal access to all services
 - Gifted and Talented Education
 - Special Education
 - Migrant Education
 - IDEA (special need services)
 - English Learner Programs
 - Career and Technical Education (CTE)
 - State Meal Program
 - Before or After School and Preschool Programs



Data Ad Hoc Workshop Summary – October 4, 2019

During the workshop, the County shared its vision of the System of Care Data Integration System (SOCDIS) Initiative and the Stakeholder Process







To clarify common language, the following terms and definitions were provided for discussion and feedback:

- Data Data elements captured in databases for programs across the jurisdiction. Data is captured to meet a determined need, to inform program delivery and to track outcomes. Examples include: demographics, status, eligibility, and linkages.
- Accessing Data The act of obtaining data elements about an individual for the purpose of care coordination. There is a reasonable expectation that access will be determined by (1) consent as given by the individual being served and (2) the need for the individual accessing the information.
- Data Sharing Data Sharing occurs in two steps:
 - Consent is given between organizations to exchange information relevant to care coordination of an individual.
 - The exchange of information is accomplished via technology and communication
