

- By January 1, 2021, CDPH to develop medical exemption form, exemption standards, and database
- MEs should meet applicable Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices (ACIP), and American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP) criteria for appropriate medical exemptions or be consistent with the relevant standard of care.





- CDPH may revoke exemptions in CAIR-ME that do not meet national standards.
- CDPH must notify Medical Board if physician has 5+ revoked MEs in one year
- Parents may appeal revoked MEs; Independent Expert Panel reviews appeals and renders final decision
- Physicians restricted from submitting new MEs if meet certain criteria (probation or pending accusation for immunizationrelated practices, or if deemed public health risk)
- Permanent MEs may remain valid until next grade span (birthpreschool, TK/K-6th, 7th-12th)





- CDPH to review subset of MEs
 - From schools (K-12) and childcares:
 - <95% immunization rate
 - Do not report rates to CDPH
 - Physicians that submit 5+ MEs in a calendar year
 - If determined it is necessary to protect public health





Physician requirements:

- Inform parent of requirements
- Conduct a physical exam of child
- If not the child's primary care physician, explain reason for filling out form instead of PCP
- Cannot charge for the form or physical exam related to renewal of a temporary medical exemption
- Authorize release of records related to exemption to CDPH and Medical Boards





California Immunization Registry – Medical Exemption Website (CAIR-ME)

The California Immunization Registry Medical Exemption web site is a secure site for physicians to issue and manage standardized medical exemptions for children in school or child care. Parents use the same site to request medical exemptions from vaccination for their children. Schools and child care facilities can monitor and get updates for medical exemptions issued for children in attendance.



California-licensed MDs and DOs can register to issue and manage medical exemptions in the CAIR Medical Exemption web site. Registration is quick and easy, with a real-time license validation through the California Department of Consumer Affairs.



If your child needs a medical exemption, register now with an email address to request the exemption from your child's doctor. The request process is quick and easy and can be done from your mobile device. The site will walk you through each step of the process.



California schools and licensed child care facilities can access the CAIR Medical Exemption web site once a child attending the school or child care facility has been issued a medical exemption. If your school or child care facility has received a medical exemption, you can request access by emailing medicalexemptions@cdph.ca.gov.

For State Partners

The California Department of Public Health provides CAIR Medical Exemption web site access to local health departments and California Medical Board and Osteopathic Medical Board staff. CDPH partners can request staff access to the California Immunization Registry Medical Exemption web site by emailing medicalexemptions@cdph.ca.gov.

Quick and easy registration:

- Registration for this secure site requires users to have a valid and verified email address
- User-initiated self-service registration for parents
- User-initiated self-service registration for physicians, includes an automated real-time license validation
- Invitation-based self-service registration for other roles (e.g., schools, childcares, LHDs).





Parents can:

- Request medical exemptions
- View the status of exemptions
- Request an appeal of a revoked exemption

Physicians licensed in California can:

Issue and manage exemptions for children in school or childcare






- Schools and Childcares can view medical exemptions for children at their site
- Local Health Departments and California Medical Boards can view exemptions and run reports
- CDPH staff can review medical exemptions and run reports
- California Health and Human Services (CHHS) staff can review and manage appeals for revoked medical exemptions

Step 2: Select a user role




The entire registration process takes less than 2 minutes.

Step 3: Get the ME number onscreen & via email (to give to the child's doctor)

care facilities


Preview of CAIR-ME: Physician Completes & Issues the ME



Step 2: Fill out the ME fields

- Additional School fields
- Medical Condition(s) & Exempted Vaccines
- Upload supporting documents
- Attest & Authorize checkboxes

Overview of Process for Issuing a ME

Physician registers to use CAIR-ME and creates account.

Parent provides physician with unique number

Physician logs in to CAIR-ME and searches for ME request by unique # or child's name

Physician determines a child needs a medical exemption and informs parent

CAIR-ME generates a unique ME request number

Physician selects ME request and completes ME fields

Parent registers to use CAIR-ME and creates account

Parent logs in to CAIR-ME and requests ME

Physician submits ME and prints copy for parent to give to school.

Status = "Issued"





Overview of Process for Filing a ME with School/Child Care Facility

Parent gives copy of ME to school; includes instructions for parent/school

School staff emails
ME program to
request access to
CAIR-ME

School staff logs in to CAIR-ME to view ME

School staff receives access code to register

School staff registers and creates account





Overview of Process if ME Revoked

Parents and physician receive email notification if ME revoked by CDPH. Within 30 days parents have two options.

Option 1: Parents begin to vaccinate their child in accordance with conditional admission schedule.

ME permanently revoked after 30 days.

School follows up until all required immunizations received.

Option 2: Parents request appeal in CAIR-ME and child continues in attendance during appeal process

Appeal is upheld. Medical exemption status returns to "Issued".

Appeal is denied.

Exemption permanently revoked. Child must receive vaccines in accordance with conditional admission schedule.

California Immunization Registry – Medical Exemption (CAIR-ME)

School and child care staff may request access to CAIR-ME after they receive a new medical exemption issued using CAIR-ME from an incoming enrollee. (1/4/21)

Medical Exemptions

1. For admissions on or after January 1, 2021, what is required for a medical exemption to a required immunization?

Starting January 1, 2021:

- Medical exemptions can only be issued through the California Immunization Registry Medical Exemption website (CAIR-ME) by physicians licensed in California.
- Schools and child care facilities may only accept from parents new medical exemptions that are issued using CAIR-ME.





If I am already a CAIR2 user, do I need to register separately for CAIR-ME access?

Yes. CAIR-ME requires a separate registration and account.





For admissions on or after January 1, 2021, what is required for a medical exemption to a required immunization?

Starting January 1, 2021:

- Medical exemptions can only be issued through the California Immunization Registry – Medical Exemption website (<u>CAIR-ME</u>) by physicians licensed in California.
- Schools and child care facilities may only accept from parents new medical exemptions that are issued using CAIR-ME.



Are medical exemptions filed for children in attendance at a California child care facility or school before 2021 valid in later years?

A medical exemption filed at a pre-kindergarten facility or school remains valid until the earliest of:

- When the child enrolls in the next grade span (TK/K-6th grade, 7th-12th grade)
- The expiration date specified in a temporary medical exemption
- Revocation of the exemption because the issuing physician has been subject to disciplinary action from the physician's licensing entity.



Do medical exemptions issued prior to 2021 need to be uploaded into CAIR-ME?

No. Existing MEs will remain on file at schools/child care facilities and are not required to be uploaded into CAIR-ME.





A doctor has told a child's parents that their child needs a medical exemption from a required immunization. How do parents get a medical exemption for their child?

Starting January 1, 2021, all new medical exemptions for school and child care entry must be issued through <u>CAIR-ME</u>. Parents can create an account and log in to CAIR-ME to submit a request for a medical exemption. Next, the child's doctor can complete the medical exemption in CAIR-ME and print a copy for the parents to give to the child's school or child care facility.





When should schools and child care facilities sign up to use CAIR-ME?

Schools and child care facilities should register to use <u>CAIR-ME</u> once they receive a medical exemption issued using CAIR-ME for one of their enrollees. Schools and child care facilities can email <u>medicalexemptions@cdph.ca.gov</u> to request access to the CAIR-ME website. After registering and creating an account, schools and child care facilities will be able to see the medical exemptions in CAIR-ME that have been issued for children that attend their school or child care facility.





Who at CDPH will review my child's medical exemption in CAIR-ME?

Medical exemptions reviewed based on the specific criteria under SB 276 and SB 714 will be reviewed by clinical staff at CDPH with expertise in immunization. Only the State Public Health Officer, or a physician they designate from the CDPH's immunization program, can revoke a medical exemption.





How early may a physician issue a medical exemption in CAIR-ME before a child first enters a grade span starting in 2021?

A medical exemption may be issued in CAIR-ME no more than 12 months before a child first enters a grade span (grade spans are birth-preschool, TK/K-6th grade, and 7th-12th grade).
